
# **2022 – 2023 Annual Report**

#### Curriculum

Lurgan JHS School aims to give its pupils a broad, balanced and relevant education. We seek to offer equal opportunities to all pupils. We seek to ensure that pupils' learning is purposeful, useful and rewarding.

Pupils are divided into four broad bands of developed ability based on Primary School data and our own baseline data. Within these streams pupils are placed in Form Classes and are taught in this arrangement for non-practical subjects. In Year 10, the three Science subjects (Biology, Chemistry and Physics) are taught separately, each for two periods a week.

All pupils study French in Year 8 and pupils in three of the four bands now take up Spanish in Year 9. Pupils follow a course in Learning for Life and Work comprising elements of Personal Development education in Year 8. In Year 9, pupils continue with one period per week of Employability. In Year 10, pupils follow a course in Citizenship. The school week is divided into 40 periods, with 35 being 40 minutes long and lunch periods of 35 minutes.

#### Assessment

Lurgan College continue to select a cohort of pupils using their own Rank Order list based on the results from Lurgan JHS examinations in March/April of Year 10, together with the results from end of Year 9 examinations. The results are split 30% Year 9 and 70% Year 10.

Parents and pupils continued to receive reports detailing their progress twice in the year. Year 10 pupils again received a report on their Term 3 progress.

The regression analysis was carried out after the December and June assessment period. This is a statistical process when a comparison is made of the pupils' attainment compared to their ability. Many of the pupils overachieved and this was celebrated with a certificate. Our Prize Day 'Endeavour' award is now based on the highest score in the analysis i.e. the person with the greatest over-achievement.

## **Target Setting**

In 2018-19 we introduced a new and more personal method of measuring pupil attainment at Key Stage 3. This involved target setting across 10 academic subjects.

Each Year 8 pupil was given individual targets for each subject which were derived from CAT4 Standardised Testing. These targets allowed pupils, teachers, and parents to understand the various levels expected of them in each subject area. At 3 points in the year, pupils completed exams/assessments which were designed to assess them against these targets. Following this, parents received a report which showed how well the pupil performed in each subject, relative to their own target. A 'traffic light'—style colour coding system made this easy to understand.

This process has been a highly successful initiative by the Curriculum Team and was recognised as such in a monitoring visit letter by ETi in October 2021, where it was described as "whole-school approach to target-setting ... with data tracking points and departmental interventions in place. Data is regularly monitored and shared with pupils and parents". The letter also stated that this means within Lurgan JHS there is "improved capacity to use pupil assessment data more effectively to set targets and track and evaluate their progress, resulting in the identification of, and greater support for, low and under-achieving pupils."

#### Careers Education

#### Careers Education 2022/23

The Careers Department had another very enjoyable and successful year. In Year 9 Careers classes, pupils had the opportunity to explore their own skills and qualities, set short and long term goals, experience the job application process and discover many areas of work with the relevant qualifications needed in each. The Careers department would like to thank individual departments for organising numerous subject specific careers events and careers lessons. This has really helped pupils to see the link between the classroom and the world of work in specific areas.

Online resources were shared with Year 10 through the creation of a Year 10 Transfer Google Classroom. The Careers department made themselves available throughout the year for any Year 10 pupil that required advice on selecting GCSE options for their next school.

The Careers Department in Lurgan Junior High School continued to work closely with the Department of the Economy's careers advisors and with our senior schools. The careers advisors provided online class talks to all Year 10 pupils in November. Mr Guy followed this up with small group careers interviews for those students that required further advice prior to choosing provisional GCSE options. Lurgan JHS Careers Department has an excellent relationship with, and has liaised closely with its counterparts in Lurgan College, Craigavon Senior High School and various other schools, in an aim to make a smooth transition for all our pupils both in terms of subject choice and pastoral care.

#### Parental Involvement

Parent meetings were held via the School Cloud online video call system. Progress review meetings were held in this way with subject teachers for Year 9 and 10 pupils in early January 2023, while Year 8 parents were able to book a School Cloud meeting with subject teachers in April.

We returned to the traditional Open Evening event, which was held for prospective entrants to Year 8 in January 2023, with classrooms open for visitors across the school, along with two addresses to parents by Mr McCoy and a showcase of the successful Drama and Music departments. Substantial numbers of parents and pupils attended and reported high levels of enthusiasm.

Parents of all pupils received reports following examinations in November and in May/June. Parents of pupils in Year 10 again received an additional report in June to reflect the work completed and assessments undertaken after the Transfer process was completed.

Parents were also given questionnaires following the examinations. Results were used to refine approaches to teaching, learning and assessment for the incoming academic year 2023-24.

An Induction Evening, which we held for the incoming Year 8 parents in June 2023, was extremely well-attended once again.

#### CHILD PROTECTION/SAFEGUARDING ACTIVITY

#### 1 Concerns of Abuse

Over the past year, we have dealt with various types of child protection/safeguarding concerns, for example: actual/suspected neglect, emotional harm, physical harm, sexualised behaviours, self-harm/suicidal thoughts, domestic abuse, on-line safety, indecent images, substance misuse, anti-social behaviours, etc.

We have regularly liaised with the CPSSS to seek advice and guidance as required and are very thankful for their support. Where there was Social Services involvement with a family, our safeguarding team made regular contact with them and also with the family, putting in place additional supports in school when it was deemed necessary or beneficial to the pupil. Examples of these supports are a Downtime Pass, referral to Steph/Reach Mentoring and referral to our school counsellors.

Members of our safeguarding team prepared reports and attended Case Conferences for pupils on the Child Protection Register. These meetings took place via Zoom. Reports for our Looked After Children were prepared for LAC reviews and a safeguarding team member attended these review meetings via Zoom.

Multi-Disciplinary Meetings were also held for some pupils with ETA, EWS and CAMHS and attended by members of our Senior Pastoral Team and/or SEN.

## 2 Training Attended/Provided

#### Designated/Deputy Designated Teacher

Mr Lunn and Mrs Kerr participated in the ABSiT training programme delivered over eight sessions which started in January 2023 and will continue into 2023-24 academic year.

#### Whole School

Awareness training was held for all members of staff, both teaching and non-teaching during our August SDDs and reflected updated guidance issued by the Department of Education. This was led by Mrs Kerr and Mr Lunn (DT and DDT respectively). An additional session was delivered at the beginning of October for canteen staff and for any staff who had been absent for the training in August.

In September, Mrs Kerr delivered safeguarding assemblies for all three year groups. This included details about our procedures for reporting any concerns and for requesting support, both inside and outside school. Safeguarding messages were also promoted regularly through our Learning for Life and Work curricular programme, pupil announcements, regular assemblies, etc. in addition to our sessions with the PSNI.

## 3 Child Protection/Safeguarding Policy Reviews

Our Mobile Phone, CCTV, Period Dignity policies were reviewed, updated and ratified this year.

#### 4 The Preventative Curriculum

Reach Mentoring carried out one-to-one sessions with 25 - 30 pupils in our Youth Annexe on Tuesday mornings for support with a variety of issues – social, emotional and behaviour difficulties.

Aspire also continued to partner with us and worked with ten FSM pupils who were underachieving.

We continued our liaison with our PSNI Neighbourhood Team delivering elements of the preventative curriculum in individual class sessions to pupils. Once again, our student council, The Pupils' Voice, hosted these sessions with great professionalism, going round the classes with the PSNI team and introducing them. The topics covered were road safety, online safety, substance misuse and anti-social behaviour. Following each session, opportunity was given for pupils to discuss related questions with their Form Teachers. Feedback from the PSNI indicated that it is a positive step in building relationships with our pupils in the community and stated that there was a notable reduction in anti-social behaviours in the local community as a result of this level of contact with the PSNI Neighbourhood team.

At the end of each half term and full term, we had Positive Mental Health & Well-being Days. We collapsed the timetable for one day and had carousel activities across the whole school which consisted of events such as special assemblies (i.e. harvest, Christmas, Easter), table quizzes, karaoke, dance-a-thon, old style party games and movies with tuckshop. These days were received very positively by both staff and pupils and provided memorable fun moments for all. A massive thank you to Mr Lunn for all his hard work, incredible energy and creativity in organising and coordinating these days.

We continued with our reward system so that pupils received recognised awards when they achieved certain levels of achievement points on SIMS Behaviour Management. We believe it is important to acknowledge the vast number of pupils who regularly follow school rules, engage in their learning to a high standard and display respect and kindness, responsibility and resilience throughout the course of the school day. These awards included phone calls home to commend pupils, canteen queue jump passes, bronze (awarded by the Form Teacher), silver (awarded by Year Heads), gold (awarded by Senior Teachers), diamond (awarded by Vice Principals) and platinum certificates (awarded by Mr McCoy) with additional treats such as bacon baps in the canteen, McFlurries, Easter eggs, Domino's pizza, disco and the platinum trip to Portrush. Form Teachers were given Data Input afternoons as part of their directed time to collate achievement points. It was a significant amount of work on the part of all staff. Feedback from staff, pupils and parents indicate that the reward system has been very positively received and pupils feel valued and appreciated

Anxiety levels, which had been rising at an alarming level prior to the pandemic, increased even further during and since the pandemic. Pupils are anxious for a variety of reasons - for example, social anxiety and still adjusting to being back in the school setting; attachment issues, not wanting to leave a parent; anxious about having missed out on their learning; anxious about not being able to focus on their learning; anxious about friendships or lack of them. Self harm and suicidal ideation are also more prevalent. Where this was brought to the attention of school, parents were contacted and asked to come into school for a meeting with Mrs Kerr or Mr Lunn along with the pupil. Parents were asked to bring their child to the GP. Several pupils were referred to CAMHS/SHIP as a result. Mrs Kerr and Mr Lunn, along with the Form Teachers and relevant Year Heads, would have regular check-ins with these pupils and parents to monitor how they were coping in the school setting. They were also issued with Downtime Passes for school so that, when they were starting to feel anxious or overwhelmed, they could leave the classroom and have space to calm down and regulate their emotions. They were also referred to Steph, our Engage teacher, as an additional support. Feedback from parents and pupils indicated that the support from school was very much appreciated and that, on many occasions, school had gone above and beyond the call of duty. A number of pupils struggled to attend school, citing anxiety as the reason. We worked alongside these pupils, parents and any external agencies involved, making reasonable adjustments to support return to school (i.e. meetings after school when school was quiet, reduced timetable, time with Steph our Engage teacher, Downtime Pass). For some of these pupils, it enabled them to fully engage with their learning and also participate in extra-curricular activities.

This year, we were delighted and grateful to have our Supported Learning teacher, Mr McGreevy, who worked with many of these pupils in a quiet learning environment to help them readjust to being back in school, with one-to-one academic and pastoral support. We had 6 – 8 pupils whose attendance was below 50% due to anxiety.

With the Engage funding school received, we continued to employ Steph Duke from Reach Mentoring, a qualified English teacher, for four days each week to support pupils both pastorally and academically. Form Teachers and Year Heads made referrals to Steph where they felt this level of intervention was needed. Over the course of the year, Steph supported up to 50 young people. For the majority of pupils referred to Steph, anxiety was the principle issue. Other reasons for referral were friendship issues, pressures of school work, low mood and family circumstances. At the end of March, this funding ended with very little notice given. However, we continued to employ Steph as it would have been grossly unfair to remove this significant support/lifeline for so many pupils. There is simply no additional time available in the teaching day for Form Teachers and Year Heads to offer the level of support they would like to give, and which is needed, in order for some pupils to engage in their learning.

Support through Links Counselling continued as a valuable resource two days a week in school and, at times, when our waiting list increased to 12 plus, we operated a third day of counselling sessions. Over the course of the year, 41 pupils were referred for counselling.

Staff had training in anti-bullying legislation during our August staff training days and also throughout the year in twilight sessions. Staff reported that they find it useful to look at case studies and these have become a regular part of the training sessions. Mr Lunn and Mrs Kerr attended the ABSIT (Addressing Bullying in Schools

Implementation Team) training programme with our Craigavon Area Learning Community. This involved looking at current practice and ensuring our systems and processes are in line with the legislation. The training will continue into 2023-24. It has been insightful for us and it has supported us with in school staff training and dealing with bullying type behaviour incidents. We plan to update our policy in 2023-24 to bring our use of language in line with recommendations made at the training.

We have used restorative practice regularly over the past year with pupils who have had friendships issues, for vaping incidents and physical altercations, with great success. Our TPV led assemblies for Anti-Bullying Week in November, and clear messages and reminders were shared with all pupils in assemblies and form time throughout the year. We encourage pupils to use 'THINK' – Is it True? Is it Helpful? Is it Inspiring? Is it Necessary? Is it Kind?

## **SEN Department**

The SEN (Special Educational Needs) department had major changes made in the personnel during 2022-2023. Mrs Moorehead (SENCo) who had held the post from 1996 retired and Ms Haughian (Assistant SENCo) moved to live in France after holding the post for 4 years. After a number of recruitment processes with no applicants, Mr Lunn and Miss Osborne Senior Teachers for Pastoral and Curriculum respectively took over the role.

The first task was creating an SEN department that was resourced and with roles defined. This process was tailored accordingly throughout the year:

Mr Lunn: Pupils on Stages 1 and 2 of the Code of Practice, including their Individual Education Plans and liaising with external agencies.

Miss Osborne: Pupils on Stage 3 of the Code of Practice, setting up the new Social Communication Class (process started in June 2023), exam access arrangements and line manager of the Classroom and General Assistants.

An official SEN office has been set up to allow a space for meeting with pupils and parents. A clear process for filing pupil information has been set up so that information for pupils can be accessed for meetings and external agencies.

Mr McGreevy worked with Miss Osborne in identifying pupils with low spelling and reading ages to take part in a 6 week intervention programme for phonics called Sounds Write. Pupils who did not make significant progress will complete a further 6 week extension programme.

Weekly Classroom Assistant (CA) meetings take place on a Friday morning. These meetings are used to update CAs with events coming up in school so that they can prepare their pupils for it, which is particularly useful for pupils with ASD. It is also used to feed back any pastoral issues or behavioural issues with the SENCO of pupils that week.

We also introduced testing for learning difficulties and behaviour. Testing will help to identify clearly the need and support targets on IEPs.

## **Summary of Accounts**

## **Charging and Remissions**

#### School Fund

It is not possible to offer the full range of activities presently available to pupils by relying solely on the resources provided by the Department of Education. The Board of Governors therefore asks parents to make a voluntary contribution of £30 per pupil, £55 per 2 pupils and £65 for 3 or more pupils per annum so that the school may continue to offer as broad a range of educational opportunities as possible. No pupil will be disadvantaged in relation to whether or not his/her parents have made such contributions.

## **Books and Stationery**

All textbooks required by each pupil are provided free of charge. The books remain the property of the school and it is expected that they will be kept in good condition and returned on demand. A charge will be made for books which have to be replaced through being lost, or by neglect, or if they are not returned, when required.

Each pupil will be provided free of charge with a reasonable amount of stationery each year. Additional stationery, if required, may be purchased privately.

## **Practical Subjects**

The cost of materials for science is met by the school.

A materials charge of £30.00 is levied on pupils in Year 8 as a contribution towards the cost of consumables for Art and Design, Home Economics, Science and Technology. Further small charges are levied as and when necessary, by these departments.

## Clothing

Parents are responsible for the provision of correct school uniform. Protective clothing and equipment required for practical subjects will be provided free of charge by the school. Parents are responsible for the provision of the correct clothing and equipment for Physical Education and Games. A used uniform facility was organised for the summer months and operates sporadically throughout the year as required.

#### Music

A charge will be made in respect of individual tuition in the playing of a musical instrument or singing lessons when these are not provided by the Education Authority.

All examination fees connected with individual music tuition will be paid by parents. A charge will also be made for the hire of musical instruments owned by the school.

## **Damage to Property**

When damage is done to School property through carelessness or misbehaviour, the school may charge up to the full cost of replacement or repair, the cost being borne by the parents of the pupils involved. **Subject & Activity Reports** 

## **Maths Department**

#### Exam Results

Last year in the Mathematics department we had excellent Key Stage 3 results with 79.8% of pupils attaining the level 5 or above in Maths. Further analysis of our results highlighted outstanding results for EAL pupils with 93.5% achieving level 5 and above.

## Maths Support

After analysis of the Assessment data pupils, red flagged in their assessments where allocated Maths support of one period a week. This has been an excellent resource for the Maths department with some pupils moving from 'red to green' from their Year 9 assessment to Year 10. During the year, Maths Support after school was also held for all years on Tuesday or Wednesday or Thursday by three Maths teachers per week, with great uptake from pupils requiring extra assistance before assessments.

## Numeracy Ninjas

In the department pupils took part in Numeracy Ninjas each week in their Maths Class. Numeracy Ninja is a Key Stage 3 intervention designed to fill gaps in students' basic mental calculation strategies and to empower them with the numeracy skills and fluency required to fully access GCSE Maths concepts when they move to Key Stage 4 study. Once per term, the highest achieving and the most improved students in each class are awarded *Grand Master* status certificate and a black pen.

#### Maths Week

Last year, in October, Mr J Black (Numeracy Coordinator) utilised the school's social media to post challenges that the pupils completed at home. The challenges proved to be very successful as we received over one hundred responses. Prizes were given out following a raffle with all pupils who worked out the correct solution to the challenge. Additionally, pupils took part in numeracy competitions in the canteen and assembly.

#### IXL

This year, IXL has been utilised by all three-year groups. IXL is an online learning application that offers unlimited, algorithmically generated questions; real-time analytical reports; and dynamic scoring to encourage mastery in Literacy and Numeracy.

#### UKMT

This year, the school entered 20 Year 10 pupils into the Intermediate UKMT Maths Challenge. This is a maths challenge that attracts entries from schools across the UK. Of all entrants, 40% will receive either a bronze, silver or gold certificate. The intermediate challenge is open for years 12 and below (NI) so the Year 10 pupils were effectively 2 years younger than most entrants for this challenge. Despite their age, they achieved one gold, four silver and seven bronze certificates. In Year 9, 20 pupils were entered for the Junior challenge, which is for pupils in year 9 and below (NI). They achieved two gold, four silver and ten bronze certificates. The Maths Department would like to congratulate all of the entrants on being chosen to represent the school at a high level and in particular a special acknowledgement to the certificate winners.

## Financial Capabilities

The Maths department arranged for 'Young Enterprise' to present to our Year 10s the PERSONAL ECONOMICS Programme which included <u>financial capability training</u>. This is always an important topic for young people, but significantly more so now due to the rise

in the cost of living. The talk covered topics such as savings, interest, money, mental health, budgeting, debt, APR, student finance, apprenticeships, earnings, tax, pensions, gambling, investments, identity theft, fraud and much more – all in a fun and interactive way!

## Dickson Plan Curriculum Mapping Project

Last year saw the launch of our pilot Curriculum Mapping Project which provided opportunities for Mrs Alexander to meet with Maths HODs from across the Dickson Plan and embark on a journey that enables us as professionals to work together to strengthen the excellent work and collaboration that already exists with a view to increasing the outcomes for the students we serve.

## **English Department and Communication Report**

In the 2022/23 school year, the English department was involved in a number of initiatives designed to benefit our students academically and encourage their enjoyment of reading.

This year we took part in the Dickson Plan pilot Curriculum Mapping Project which provided opportunities for subject leaders to meet and collaborate with a view to increasing the outcomes for our students. English subject leaders from the junior and senior schools met on four occasions throughout the year. During these meetings we worked on two key areas where common approaches could be adopted to benefit pupils and ease transition between the key stages. The areas chosen were editing of written work and familiarising students with key question stems in preparation for GCSE tasks and assessments. This was a valuable opportunity to

share good practice and to work towards developing consistent approaches between the junior and senior schools.

Reading Club began in January 2023 to encourage readers from all three year groups to read and discuss books in a social setting, aiming to focus on a different book each term. Meetings were arranged by Mrs K Carson and took place fortnightly, after school, to discuss the reading in person. Between these meet-ups weekly discussion points and quizzes were posted for members to complete on Google Classroom.

Literacy Week took place from Monday, 27th February to Friday, 3rd March. Mrs J Graham, as literacy co-ordinator, organised several activities to encourage reading throughout the school. Pupils were invited to enter a whole school competition where they were asked to recreate the cover of their favourite books. Year group assemblies showcased the importance of literacy and reading across school and featured a literary quiz on stage. Literacy-based brain-teasers featured daily in the canteen with winning tables in each year group awarded prizes for correctly solving each clue.

We progressed well in all areas targeted in the departmental action plan for the 2022-23 school year. The use of Google Classroom continues to be well-embedded across the department with master classrooms for all year groups which are accessed by teachers for individual classes. Pupil surveys showed 98.3 % of pupils were aware of the materials being regularly posted and were able to access them easily. We have practised and embedded effective questioning techniques with pupil surveys showing staff regularly use these strategies in lessons. Assessments show that 89% of students in all year groups are achieving or approaching their targets in English. All members of the English department participated in staff training regarding a knowledge rich curriculum,

and worked collaboratively to produce knowledge organisers for the use of Year 8 pupils in the next academic year.

In conclusion, this was another productive and purposeful year for the English department. We hope to build on the progress made moving into the 2023-2024 academic year.

## **Art Department**

The Art and Design department has undertaken many changes within the last year. With a new Head of Department in place there has been implementation of new initiatives that we feel have allowed the department to develop positively both academically and within our extra-curricular contributions to school life.

Updated schemes of work have been put in place that embrace the previous good practice within the department and encourage creative skills alongside a knowledge-rich curriculum that prepares pupils for further study at GCSE level. Knowledge organisers have been created for key subject areas within the Art and Design Curriculum for year 8. Differentiated knowledge organisers have been created to ensure all pupils can access and understand the content.

We have made excellent progress in showcasing the high standard of pupils' work in LJHS by updating display boards in corridors and classrooms. We have regularly posted imagery of successful classwork, competitions, and Art club on social media and have added examples of excellence to our teaching resources to inspire pupils' outcomes.

Excellent examination practice has been established following a successful trial period for Year 8 winter and summer series in 2022 23. An assessment matrix which has been modelled on the GCSE

matrix is in place for Key Stage 3 marking. In line with GCSE, our grade boundaries ensure that our assessment process is clearly understood. We have created examination papers that include a written component that tests pupils' key knowledge. We have witnessed Year 8 pupils revising for their Art assessment effectively and we are excited to see this further developed for all year groups. Assessment sheets for classwork have been updated in line with the guidance provided on our matrix. Marking has been standardised and samples of assessed work are stored in separate folders for each year group to showcase the levels within our marking.

We feel that initiatives to promote the Art and Design department have enhanced the profile of the department, for example the whole school Christmas card competition in October 2022 was a great success. The winning entry was mature and skilful.

The department promoted careers within Art and disseminated information about the GCSE course to develop pupils' awareness of the Creative Industries. We enjoyed a very successful off timetable day with Year 10 pupils who were keen to choose Art GCSE. In December 2022, we visited the F. E. McWilliam gallery in Banbridge and hosted professional Artists talks by Michelle Wilson and Nicholas Hamilton. We continued links with schools within the Dickson plan by inviting Heads of senior school Art Departments in to talk to our pupils about Key Stage 4. Mrs Bell attended the opening viewing of the CCEA 'True Colours' exhibition at the Ulster Museum which showcased work by one of our past pupils.

We celebrated success with our entries in the Lurgan Credit Union competition and received 1<sup>st</sup> 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> place prizes at Lurgan Show in June 2023.

Our extra-curricular Art club has grown in popularity. Pupils worked hard on several projects and competitions and thoroughly enjoyed

contributing to the props for our school production of 'Matilda' in June 2023. Art club made Alphabet boxes, Bruce's fabulous chocolate cake and signage for the fantastic event.

## Geography

The Geography department has continued to provide our pupils with educational experiences of the highest quality. We have been focused on developing the Geography curriculum, moving towards preparation for GCSE case study extended questions. New resources and guided answers have been produced for Year 9 and 10 case studies.

In addition, retrieval practice and low stakes quizzing has been built into lessons as teaching resources have been updated. We have moved away from Active Inspire teaching resources to google slides. This was a major shift and allows all resources to be shared with pupils on google drive and google classroom. Furthermore, we produced Year 8 knowledge organisers for this current academic year as the school moves towards a knowledge rich curriculum.

We were pleased to be able to enhance the teaching of the Farming unit of work with an educational visit to the Balmoral show in May. Mr McFarland and Mrs Walmsley accompanied 50 Year 10 pupils to this event. The purpose of this trip is to support the teaching of how physical and human factors influence our local farmers. The pupils thoroughly enjoyed this event.

Pupils have also had the opportunity to be out of the classroom investigating the local area and developing fieldwork skills giving them a good foundation for GCSE field work. Year 8 pupils carried out a Litter Survey and, back in class, were taught to present and analyse the data collected. Year 9 carried out a Traffic Survey and

Year 10 took part in orienteering around the school grounds to develop their map reading skills.

ICT continues to be a major focus for Geography at Lurgan JHS. Online testing and retrieval resources continue to be created and are a huge success in motivating and supporting our pupils' learning. We continued to use a 'learning log', a weekly log, updated by each teacher, with details of the work missed, including signposting to the slides required from the teaching slides and booklet page numbers. This allows pupils to see what work they have missed and allows for catch up if absent.

The Geography department continues to use our own Instagram page. The number of followers continues to grow, including parents, offering a chance to further showcase our school. This has proven a useful way to communicate with our pupils and to build interest and enthusiasm for our subject in addition to our contributions to the school Facebook page.

## **History Department**

## Curriculum Update

In 2022/23 the department's focus was on further embedding the use of Google Classroom to promote high standards of pupil learning. Secondly, there was a focus on continuing to ensure consistent use of effective teaching and learning strategies such as effective questioning and retrieval practice. Finally, there was a focus on continuing to develop strategies to support students with additional needs.

Pupil feedback and teacher professional judgment showed that the use of Google Classroom to support pupil learning has been fully embedded across the History Department. There was strong

feedback from pupils that they used the resources when revising for their assessments or completing work which they missed when they were off school.

Throughout the year, students with additional needs received subject specific support through writing frames/ sentence starters, tailored booklets and one to one support from teachers and classroom assistants. Pupils with additional needs was a standing item on the agenda for department meetings with support sought from the SEN and Newcomer Coordinators.

On several occasions throughout the year, department staff took part in Teacher Professional Learning training and completed reading on effective questioning and retrieval strategies. Feedback from pupil surveys and discussions at department meetings showed that effective teaching strategies such as 'Cold Calling, Say It Again Better', and various retrieval activities were used regularly throughout the year across the department to consolidate pupil knowledge and understanding.

## Remembrance Day

On 11<sup>th</sup> November, the History Department organised a short Remembrance Day assembly which was watched by all form classes and was followed by a two-minute silence.

#### Shared Education

Mr Addley, along with colleagues from St Ronan's College, Lurgan, was involved in facilitating two history workshops for two different Shared Education cohorts. The focus of the workshops was to explore Unionist and Nationalist identity with a focus on the Irish

Home Rule crisis and the Unionist and Nationalist involvement in WW1.

## **Home Economics**

In Home Economics, we help to prepare our pupils for independent living. It is a practical subject that can promote and enhance the wellbeing of individuals, families and communities through understanding food choice, nutritional health, consumer issues and relationships. This subject strand aims to equip pupils with the knowledge, skills and values that will help them to make appropriate lifestyle choices.

Last year, in the Home Economics' Department we created two new topics; 'Budgeting' and 'Love Food, Hate Waste' as well as updating all topics to ensure they were all of a high standard with plenty of stretch and challenge. In addition, assessments continued to be updated with GCSE style questions incorporated to ensure appropriate level of challenge. Furthermore, we produced Year 8 knowledge organisers for the incoming Year 8. We also reintroduced the Year 10 practical assessment which challenged pupils to plan, prepare and evaluate a meal on a budget of £5. This was very successful as pupils demonstrated a range of impressive skills and it gave prospective GCSE pupils an insight into the practical assessment at GCSE.

Furthermore, the department. was involved in the Curriculum Mapping Project which provided opportunities for Heads of Departments across the Dickson Plan to meet and strengthen the excellent work and collaboration that already exists. This proved to

be very beneficial as we now have stronger links with all Home Economic Departments across the Dickson Plan and a clear focus to improve and strengthen the delivery of all nutritional knowledge shared at Key Stage 3. We will continue to discuss nutrition during practicals and have already included more nutritional information and activities in booklets for this academic year to improve and embed pupils' nutritional knowledge.

Our department hosted two extra-curricular activities last year: the Year 8 Cookery Club and the annual Lurgan Junior High School Bake Off! The cookery club was a great success. Between 12 to 18 pupils attended the 6-week programme and their enthusiasm and confidence increased each week. Pupils were given the opportunity to develop a range of skills due to the carefully selected practicals which included cheesy cups, sausage rolls, fruit skewers, blueberry muffins, chicken goujons and butterfly cakes.

Finally, we celebrated and congratulated the seven pupils who participated in the 'Lurgan JHS Bake Off! 2022'. Their creativity, enthusiasm, skill and attention to detail and levels of commeradery were superb! We extend our sincere thanks to Mr Sydney McCormick, the founding owner of The Kosy Bakery in Lurgan for his encouragement, generosity and kindness towards our pupils in supporting this event. Also, a special thanks to Miss Ally Drennan for assisting with the judging, as well as our principal, Mr McCoy who tasted and reviewed all of the delightful bakes. We have many promising bakers at Lurgan JHS and we thank all parents/guardians who supported our pupils to give them the resources and confidence to take part.

## **ICT**

Last year, the ICT department continued to build on the successful teaching of a number of computer science based topics, such as Website Development and Python Programming to give our pupils broad and balanced ICT lessons. We introduced the topic of Game Development to Year 10 pupils which was well received. We were encouraged by the effort and results produced from students in each year group and continue to celebrate their success in the subject.

This year we had the opportunity again to continue the training with staff in areas of ICT to aid with their professional development. In August, Miss Quinn held a training session with staff to upskill and support them with their use of technology. We were pleased to see the progress that staff have made following on from this training. With the support of Mr Johnston, we also introduced Guardian Summaries which allowed parents/guardians from all year groups to receive regular updates on their child's activity on Google Classroom. We were delighted to hear of the positive feedback from this.

The ICT department continued to enhance their own professional development during this academic year. Miss Quinn and Mr Johnston had the opportunity to attend training sessions on the use of the Microsoft Surface Pro which they passed to the staff.

This year we continued with the extra-curricular ICT club for Years 9 and 10. The pupils who attended thoroughly enjoyed getting the chance to learn more about technology with lessons on Programming in C#, Microbits and the IDEA award with Miss Quinn and Mr Johnston. We look forward to the resumption of this club again next year.

## **Modern Languages**

In September 2022, we welcomed Mrs McCorry into the Modern Languages Department as she took up the role of teaching French & Spanish, as well as supporting EAL pupils. Her input into the development of assessment resources was invaluable, with years of experience as a GCSE French examiner, she helped ensure that the assessments we set for pupils in all 3 terms equipped them for the assessment challenges they would face studying languages at GCSE.

This academic year, we introduced a new scheme in Year 8 French and Year 9 Spanish, based on the extensive processing instruction (E.P.I.) approach as championed by Gianfranco Conti, who has produced 'The Language Gym' website and accompanying textbooks. This means pupils are flooded with comprehensible input; content is organised by communicative functions and related constructions with a big focus on reading and listening as modelling. The units are designed so there are lots of systematic recycling and interleaving which allows for stronger retention and transfer of learning which has led to better outcomes in classwork, homework and assessments.

At the end of September 2022, Mrs Wright went on maternity leave and we welcomed Miss Robinson into the department to take on her role. We continued to embed the use of Google Classroom with all department members producing resources and sharing them via the Google Classrooms to ensure that all pupils studying Modern Languages have equal access to the teaching and learning resources. All department members and their pupils have benefited from this consistent approach with 89% pupils reporting they were able to access Google Classroom resources from home to support their learning.

In October 2022, we said au revoir to Ms Haughian, a highly valued member of the Modern Languages Department, Pastoral Team and Assistant SENCo. We were delighted to welcome Mrs Cunningham to the department, in November 2022, to take on Ms Haughian's timetable.

On Friday 24th February, our assembly hall was packed with pupils eagerly anticipating this year's French play, 'La Maison Hantée', brought to us by the Onatti Theatre Company. Julien and Eugénie, two French actors, captivated the audience with convincing and comedic portrayals of their characters, all in French, of course, which was a wonderful learning opportunity for our pupils.

In term 3, our focus was on produced the knowledge organisers for Year 8 French to be ready for September 2023. This was a useful opportunity to evaluate the essential learning for Year 8 pupils. We also worked on preparing our schemes of work for Year 9 and 10 French and Year 10 Spanish to follow 'The Language Gym' textbook.

## P.E. Department Report

## **Girls' Department**

It has been another exciting and rewarding year for Girls' Hockey in Lurgan Junior High School. The U13A team and the U14A team competed in Mid-Ulster League competitions with the U13A finishing Runners-Up in their competition. The enthusiastic 12A and 12B teams enjoyed their first experience of competitive hockey and also had the opportunity to play a number of Saturday morning friendly games towards the end of the season.

Trials were held mid-September and a number of our talented players were selected to take part in the Ulster Hockey Talent Development Programme. This programme takes place over a twelve-week period and requires much commitment on the part of players and parents. A huge congratulations to Alex Kerr on their selection to this year's programme. Also, well done to four of the Under 13 squad who were invited to attend last year's coaching sessions as part of Ulster Hockey's Regional Talent Programme. Well done to Camryn Wilson, Lydia Neill, Sophie Harrison and Lucy Brown who were nominated to attend this year.

Hockey practices commenced for all three age groups in early September. On Tuesdays and Thursdays, the 13A and 14A girls trained with Mrs Saunderson and Susan Gibson on a Tuesday and Miss McCann, Mrs Saunderson and Lee Wilson on a Thursday. A talented group of Year 8 girls attended after-school practice under the guidance of Mrs Cochrane and Mrs Ferry and both 'A' and 'B' teams were fielded in league competitions with both teams competing with great success.

The Saturday morning Hockey programme commences on the last Saturday in August and offers our girls the opportunity to compete with the Hockey playing schools from across the province. #### Netball Club 2022/23

There was an excellent response to the commencement of Netball for Year 9 and 10 after school in September as up to 30 girls in each year group attended. Training was divided into separate year groups to manage numbers until team selection was decided. The A squads trained every week ,while the B squads enjoyed social Netball on selected dates.

Teams were re-entered into the NI Area League and Cup competitions last year after the covid break as well as the local Vista league and Cup, and it proved to be a very busy season.

The Year 9 and 10 teams were in the NI A League which proved to be a misplacement as the standard of play was high, and while they won a few games, overall, they were being beaten with a big goal difference. This proved to be very demoralizing for the girls, but they always played with determination and displayed good

sportsmanship. Next year, we plan to play in the B league for more fair competition.

After being defeated in the first round of the NI Cup, our Year 9 team had pleasing success in the NI Shield reaching the semi-final where they unfortunately lost to a strong Ballymena Academy team.

The girls enjoyed playing in the Vista League against local schools with mixed results, but there were some very tight games. The Vista Cup was played over two tournament days and both Year 9 and 10 teams really enjoyed the competition and played super Netball. Well done to the Year 10 team who finished in third place and congratulations to Emma Cushley, Year 9, who won Player of the Tournament.

There was a fantastic interest in the extra-curricular Year 8 Netball which commenced in October. Up to 40 girls were coached by Miss Lyness each week, who was also assisted by Mrs Quinn. A team attended the NI Year 8 Tournament in Magherafelt and performed well, finishing in third place. In the Vista Tournament the Year 8 team did even better coming Runners-Up and they received silver medals.

To end the season and to acknowledge commitment and loyalty to Netball all year, we organised the Year 10 team to meet for a meal and share memories of the sporting year.

#### Girls' Football

The Junior Boys' team of Matthew Lamont (5<sup>th</sup>), Charlie Gault (7<sup>th</sup>), Michael Robinson, Charlie Robinson, Ben Ross, Freddie McTernaghan, Jamie Pedlow and Harry Stevenson would win team Gold Medals in the District Championships to ensure all three boys teams would qualify for the Ulster Schools' Finals.

#### Football

Lurgan JHS had the most successful season in history last year bringing home 6 trophies across the 3 year groups. With a wealth of talent throughout the school, the U13 team in the end, were the most successful. They won every single game that they played winning the Northern Ireland Cup, Mid-Ulster Cup and Mid-Ulster League. This talented team will represent Northern Ireland in the Allen McKinstrey 5 Nations Competition this coming May in Wales. The U14 team also had an unbelievable season, winning the Mid-Ulster League, Mid-Ulster Cup and battling their way through 5 rounds to reach the final of the Northern Ireland Cup. It wasn't to be in the final in front of a 600 strong crowd at the Blanchflower stadium in Belfast. The U12s also had a good year winning the Mid-Ulster Cup, finishing Runners Up by a single point in the Mid-Ulster League and reaching the quarter final of the Northern Ireland Cup where they were beaten by the eventual winners St Columb's. The U12, 13 and 14 'B' teams also gave excellent accounts of themselves in the small schools leagues playing against 'A' teams from the local area. Numbers at training were excellent all year and exceeded 100 each week across the 3 year groups.

#### Cricket

Lurgan JHS had a short, but enjoyable cricket season. Numbers at training were excellent across the 3 year groups, and Lurgan JHS would like to thank Lurgan CC for the use of their facilities and in providing coaches every Tuesday afternoon. The U12 and U14 teams entered the Wesley Ferris Cup and the Derriaghy Cup, and had competitive matches against Wallace, Belfast High, Ballyclare High and The Royal School Armagh. The highlight of the season was a 126 run victory against Belfast HS, when Harry Stevenson scored 92 runs and Nathaniel King took 5 wickets for only 2 runs.

## **Religious Education**

Last year, we welcomed two new temporary members of staff to the RE teaching team, Mrs Stewart, and Mr Saadat to deliver our curriculum. All members of the Department delivered assemblies throughout the year, covering topics such as Mental Health Day, The Holocaust and Dr Martin Luther King Jnr and New Beginnings.

Pupils who attend Scripture Union presented our Harvest Assembly and local youth leaders from Hill St. Presbyterian and Emmanuel churches were invited to deliver our special Christmas and Easter Assemblies. Pupils were selected from each year group to provide readings and musical items were organised together with the Music Department.

In October Miss Lyness, organised a special presentation on the Tabernacle to assist with our Year 10 curriculum. Mr Gilliland brought in a model of the tabernacle and gave an informed talk on its structure and importance as a place where God could meet and dwell with the Israelites. Pupils had an opportunity to view the model and to ask and answer questions. This really helped our students to embed their knowledge of the Exodus story and understand the rituals of worship.

In January, we welcomed Miss Boyd as a student teacher on placement from Stranmillis College Belfast. She taught well prepared lessons with all staff, made satisfactory progress and also contributed to SU after school. We are pleased as a department to share our expertise and skills to assist with the training of teachers.

Prior to Year 10 and Year 9 exams, additional revision classes were provided for pupils who were identified as not meeting their target, to develop confidence and encourage improvement in academic performance.

The year ended with a farewell to Mr Saadat and Mrs Stewart, and we thank them for all they contributed to the department and wish them well for the future.

## **Science Department**

In 2022-23, following a year of staff absence and challenges in finding subject-specific teachers, the Science Department returned to its full complement of permanent staff: Mrs Carson (Head of Department), Mrs Cochrane, Mrs Ferry, Mrs Kennedy, Mr Lawther (teachers) and Mr Clifford (technician). This led to a settled academic year when we had confidence that classes were taught Science by subject specialists and pupils were able to fully access all aspects of the curriculum.

## Academic Progress

The Department welcomed the opportunity to return to normal class teaching, including a full engagement in practical activities following the Covid restrictions, albeit with extra focus on basic hygiene practices. It has been good to witness students' enthusiasm in developing hands-on skills in addition to increasing their knowledge within the subject area. It was obvious, however, that the Year 10 group especially had missed out on experience in the laboratory at various stages of Years 8 and 9, and time was spent catching up on simple practical techniques and safety procedures before they could fully progress.

Students in 10A1 to 10A10 continued to learn and be examined on the same material. Some pupils in 10A10 excelled in the Science transfer examinations, while others struggled to achieve their target marks, and the challenge remains to make examinations accessible to all students, whilst fully stretching the most able. Having provided online resources during periods of teaching remotely, we now have an excellent bank of revision resources which we were able to present to pupils in all year groups as examinations approached. Feedback from pupil surveys would indicate that these resources were widely used and appreciated by a majority of students.

After-school revision support was offered to Year 10 pupils who were achieving significantly below their Science target, however, these classes were attended only by a small number of those invited. All attendees improved upon their marks in subsequent Science assessments.

Like other departments, we set about developing our contributions to the new Year 8 Knowledge Organisers. Having already created revision summary sheets for every topic, pioneered by Mrs A Ferry over the past several years, we had the basic structure in place for the knowledge organisers, which we are confident will be of benefit to our incoming Year 8 cohort.

## Continuing Professional Development

All departmental teaching staff attended professional training delivered in school, which sought to maximise pupils' benefit from teaching and learning as well as to provide consistent behaviour management throughout the school.

Throughout the academic year, Mrs Carson represented the department in the Craigavon Area Learning Community Forum, where Science leaders from local post-primary schools focused on achieving a common approach to scientific language and

definitions. As a result of this, booklets and presentations for the incoming year have been scrutinised and developed to include precise CCEA Science definitions and language in line with that used in senior schools.

Our Science Technician, Mr Clifford, continued to attend Health and Safety Committee meetings through NIPSA and ICTU, keeping him, and consequently the department, up-to-date on legislation and the latest NI Health and Safety reports. In July 2023, he attended a presentation at the Labour Relations Agency regarding Respect in the Workplace.

#### **Facilities**

Laboratory safety has been further improved with the installation of carbon dioxide monitors and an extra layer of gas supply system protection across the Science rooms.

Maintenance to mend broken taps and sink drainage units was carried out and this is much appreciated.

## Staffing Changes

In March, Mrs Carson stepped down from the position of Head of Department for Science after 7 years, as she seeks to reduce her timetable going forward. As Mrs Kennedy has now taken over this role, she, along with the rest of the Science Department, would like to take this opportunity to record our thanks to Mrs Carson for her dedication, guidance and sensitive leadership over those years.

#### Educational Visits

In June, a team of Year 10 students were delighted to enter "The Big Science Quiz" for Key Stage 3 pupils at St John the Baptist's College, Portadown, organised by Craigavon Area Learning Community and Almac. The team comprising Lauren, Glen, Matthew and Freddy, under the guidance of Mrs Cochrane, acquitted themselves well, coming in second place and being excellent ambassadors for our school.

#### **Shared Education**

Last year, we proceeded to re-establish our Shared Education Partnership with St Ronan's College for the first time in two years, due to previous restrictions from Covid-19. Despite the funding provided for Shared Education being significantly reduced, we successfully facilitated various projects taking place throughout the academic year. To re-introduce our partnership, Mr McErlane and

Miss Lyness created a video outlining the purpose of our Shared Education Partnership to be shown in assembly to all pupils, with the aim of strengthening the successful links we built prior to Covid.

## Year 8 and 9 Projects

During the Winter and Spring term 2022-23, 60 pupils from across Years 8 and 9 from both schools participated in a 6-session project. This project was planned and delivered by Mrs Pogue, Mr Addley and Mr Sadaat from Lurgan Junior High, alongside three colleagues from St Ronan's College. During the sessions, the pupils investigated the events and consequences of WW1, The Troubles and the recent conflict in Ukraine. In addition, they studied and analysed examples of War Poetry in mixed groups, creating their own version of a poem

based on war and conflict. Finally, both year groups listened to and analysed different music created as a response to conflict and chose one song to practise and perform together as a group. Feedback from pupils and their parents who took part in these projects was positive, with both parents and pupils stating that the projects opened opportunities to form new friendships and overcome existing disparities.

#### 'Cuchulainn Initiative'

From January to April 2023, Ulster GAA delivered the 'Cuchulainn Initiative' to a group of 60 girls (across Years 10-12) from Lurgan Junior High, St Ronan's College and Brownlow Integrated College. The programme was a cross-community initiative with the aim of bringing together young people from different community backgrounds through Gaelic games. In February, 12 girls (4 from each participating school) were selected to progress in the programme and train for the Cuchulainn Cup. Despite being a newly established team with no prior experience of playing Gaelic Football, they defeated 5 teams at the Cuchulainn Blitz and won the Cuchulainn Cup.

Due to their superb performance at the Cuchulainn Blitz, the Lurgan Cuchulainns were selected to attend the 'All British Championship Games' in London in July 2023. The team began training together in March and we were immensely proud of how hard they worked to develop their skills in a new sport and their relationships/friendships with one another. They competed against 5 established Gaelic teams and reached the semi-final, winning 4 out of the 5 matches they played. The team showed true commitment and dedication throughout the entire programme and enjoyed a well-deserved trip to Thorpe Park, a walking tour of London and London's Westfield Shopping Centre.

This opportunity enabled the teams to create lifetime memories and we are extremely grateful to Ulster GAA who organised and facilitated the programme and to Coach Pierce Caherty, who encouraged and supported the girls from the beginning. The team has recently attended a Mayor Reception in Craigavon Civic Centre. They are completing their Level 1 Coaching Qualification in October 2023 and will attend a trip to Croke Park in December 2023 to conclude their programme.

## Cinemagic Project

In June 2023, we facilitated and took part in a cross-community 'Cinemagic Project' in collaboration with St Ronan's College. This was an excellent opportunity to develop pupils' knowledge and skills of scriptwriting, film making and producing their own film. The short film was formally viewed at a showcase in Belfast and presented during assembly to the pupils at Lurgan Junior High and St Ronan's College.

We are very much looking forward to another successful year of Shared Education in the 2023-24 academic year.

## **Technology and Design**

## Staffing Changes

Last year the TD department said goodbye to Mr R Poots after over 30 years of service. Mr Poots was a very dedicated and practical teacher, who contributed massively to the department both as a teacher and head of department for many years. We wish him every blessing in his retirement. Mrs J Quinn has since joined our ranks and has quickly become a fantastic asset to the department, contributing to the development of resources, teaching and practical work.

#### Practical Work

Pupils very much enjoyed their practical lessons in the workshop last year and the projects they manufactured. All classes engaged well with practical lessons and have really benefited from the skills and knowledge being developed throughout. Engagement with practical activities in the workshop provides pupils with the opportunity to become increasingly confident using various tools and machinery, as well as developing their problem-solving skills.

## Integration of Literacy and Numeracy

Last year in the TD classroom, pupils were encouraged to develop both their literacy and numeracy skills. Pupils have been encouraged to convert measurements, estimate lengths, and accurately mark out their work. Extended writing questions have also been integrated into lessons and examinations to encourage critical thinking whilst promoting high levels of written communication. Through this, pupils can recognise the importance of literacy and numeracy across the curriculum.

#### Technician

Mrs L Todd continues to be a fantastic asset to the Technology and Design department. Mrs Todd ensures that all the materials and resources required for practical lessons are prepared and ready for use when the pupils arrive.

## ICT Upgrade

Following the 20 PC units that were installed in Miss C McCann's classroom a few years ago, we received an additional 20 units last year. The planning room adjoining Mrs Quinn's room will now be

turned into a computer room for the TD department, allowing computer access for all TD classes now, which is amazing. The computers will be a great asset to teaching and learning within the subject, providing pupils with the opportunity to programme circuits and learn Computer Aided Design.

## Lurgan Heritage Scheme

Last year, the ABC Council offered us the opportunity to participate in a restoration project to restore railings from historic buildings in Lurgan town centre with the Lurgan Heritage Scheme. As a result, 30 pupils spent the day at Moneypenny's Blacksmiths, learning the various black smithing techniques. The pupils thoroughly enjoyed this opportunity and it was a great learning experience.
